Questions 1, 4 and 7 (Application)

Developing Write a single-clause sentence using a given modal verb.

Expected Write a multi-clause sentence using a given modal verb. Includes semi-modal verb 'used to'.

Greater Depth Write a multi-clause sentence using a given modal verb. Includes uncommon modal expressions such as, 'dare to', 'need to', 'had better' and 'rather'.

Questions 2, 5 and 8 (Application)

Developing Substitute the given modal verb in a sentence for one that will alter the certainty or possibility. Uses modal verbs in single-clause sentences.

Expected Substitute the given modal verb in a sentence for one that will alter the certainty or possibility. Uses modal and semi-modal verbs in single and multi-clause sentences.

Greater Depth Substitute the given modal verb in a sentence for one that will alter the certainty or possibility. Uses multi-clause sentences. Includes expressions such as, 'dare to', 'need to', 'had better' and 'rather'.

Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Reasoning)

Developing Explain how replacing the modal verb in a sentence changes the certainty or possibility. Uses modal verbs in single-clause sentences.

Expected Explain how replacing the modal verb in a sentence changes the certainty or possibility. Uses modal and semi-modal verbs in single and multi-clause sentences. Includes semi-modal verb 'ought to'.

Greater Depth Explain how replacing the modal verb in a sentence changes the certainty or possibility. Uses multi-clause sentences. Includes semi-modal verbs in the negative, as well as uncommon modal expressions such as, 'dare to', 'need to', 'had better' and 'rather'.

Application and Reasoning Using Modal Verbs

Developing

1a. Any grammatically correct sentence including the word <u>might</u>, for example: We <u>might</u> go to the cinema.

2a. Replacing 'will' for might, may, could, should or ought to.

3a. It is no longer certain that the engineer will fix the machine.

Expected

4a. Any grammatically correct sentence including the word <u>used to</u>, for example: Jenny <u>used to</u> play the violin very well but she hasn't played for a long time.

5a. Replacing 'should' for shall, must or will.

6a. It is no longer certain that the football team will score the winning goal.

Greater Depth

7a. Any grammatically correct sentence including the words <u>dare to</u>, for example: He didn't <u>dare to</u> miss the deadline as he knew he would be in trouble.

8a. Replacing 'need to' for must, and 'could' for will or shall.

9a. It is no longer a command, but a suggestion.

<u>Developing</u>

1b. Any grammatically correct sentence including the word <u>will</u>, for example: It <u>will</u> be a lovely day tomorrow.

2b. Replacing 'may' for shall, must or will.

3b. It changes the necessity. It is now imperative that they help.

Expected

4b. Any grammatically correct sentence including the word <u>can</u>, for example: We <u>can</u> meet outside the swimming pool.

5b. Replacing 'will' for might, may, could, should or ought to.

6b. It changes the necessity. It is now necessary that they get there early.

<u>Greater Depth</u>

7b. Any grammatically correct sentence including the words <u>would rather</u>, for example: I <u>would rather</u> go to the beach than the cinema because it is a lovely day.

8b. Replacing 'must' for should, had better, need to or ought to, and 'will' for may or might.

9b. It changes the certainty. They will now definitely be going shopping.
